Two days after Hurricane Sandy ransacked the Crisfield MD area, my daughter called her mother and me describing all the flooding and devastation.

She had only begun to work there a month

earlier, having already put down roots and meeting the people affected by the dangerous Superstorm. She witnessed many people's homes

and cars flooded with some 2 – 5 feet of the Chesapeake Bay storm surge. Families were displaced and there was an immediate need for food and warm coats.

The local hospital

was serving as a make shift shelter for the employees and their families; others were at a local high school or out-of-town motels and hotels.

One thing we can say for our daughter is that she has always had a heart for missions, and it was one of the reasons she took the

job in this small, underserved community where she believed she could make a difference as a Pediatric Nurse Practitioner. But, this conversation was not about her work, instead it was a plea for us to find some way to help respond to the immediate needs of a town in shock, mourning the loss of homes, cars and much more.

I asked our daughter to get a name of a local United Methodist Pastor so relief could go through church channels. As is the way with God, it turns out one of the contractors working with her to set up her clinic just happened to be on the Staff Parish Committee of a local UMC. Therefore, a connectional plan was put in place to receive food and coats to be distributed in this small, devastated community.

Our Elizabeth River District had an opportunity to respond on short order - a time period of less than a week. And **RESPOND YOU DID!** Thanks to your generosity, our district sent approximately 12 DOZEN winter coats and over 100 boxes of non-perishable foods; PLUS over \$2000 in gift cards to purchase cold foods and cleaning supplies.

There will be continual opportunities to support victims of Hurricane Sandy, not only in Crisfield, but in all areas that were in the path of this Superstorm. United Methodist Disaster Early Response Teams already have been deployed, and there will be a large number of United Methodist Volunteers in Missions Teams needed for weeks and months to come.

Thank you so much for your generous spirit in this particular relief effort. And also, special thanks to the churches that served as DROP-OFF points from around the district: Lynnhaven, Great Bridge, McKendree and Beech Grove.

Outreach & Missions Team Up for a Successful 2012

Outreach and Missions committees combined efforts this year and have accomplished much as a team. We started with the annual "Souper Bowl" Sunday at the Wesley Community Center in Portsmouth by delivering soup and a donation to the Stop World Hunger Program. Later in the year, we returned for a tour and talk from Director John Hatcher and also supported the center with a \$250 art scholarship at Camp Rainbow in the summer.

New opportunities to support our youth including engaging the Confirmation Class in a pair of activities during their course, including making a Wesley Center donation. We also funded \$4,500 in college book scholarships for Beech Grove students and managed the collection and delivery of school supplies to our neighborhood Driver Elementary and Florence Bower Elementary Schools. Each school also received a \$300 check.

Once again, we sponsored a Missionary thorough Global Ministries (\$2,500) and oversaw the donation of 130 Health Kits to UMCOR. We've also started a new fund for future Missionary trips. We participated in the St. Andrews Potato Drop at Magnolia UMC in April and hosted a "Soda Jerk" Ice Cream Social for the Congregation in July.

By teaming up for Driver Days, we earned nearly \$600 selling dry goods including plants and other donated merchandise. We're currently working toward our goal of filling 150 stockings for the Salvation Army and feeding needy families with Christmas baskets.

Throughout the year, we continued to participate in Salvation Army Luncheon programs and assisted with bills for families in need. Thank you for continuing to support all of our efforts to aide those in need in our community and around the world.



2012 State of the Church Report

Beech Grove UMC, Suffolk, VA

Greetings Brothers and Sisters in Christ! We have much to be proud of in 2012. Beech Grove membership grew by twelve; eight by profession of faith. We confirmed six of our youth. Laity had positive experiences at the Society for St. Andrew Potato Drop and as Camp Rainbow counselors. A 3-5 year old Sunday School class was started. Over 20 laity completed Disciple I and II studies and a Disciple III study is ongoing. We met 100% of our annual apportionments. And we ventured out into the world of social media.

Yet, as we close out another church year and look toward 2013, we find ourselves in a precarious position. Society's attitude toward religion threatens our ability to fully answer God's call. The national religious landscape, which has been changing for the good part of three decades, is not favorable. Pew reported in October that one in five Americans say they have no religious affiliation. A Gallup poll this year revealed that a long-term decline in Americans' confidence in organized religion fell again for 2012. A Barna Group study indicates that we're losing youth; nearly three out of every five young Christians disconnect either permanently or for an extended period of time from church life after age 15. 84% of young adult Christians admit that they have no idea how the Bible applies to their field or professional interests. UMC membership and average worship attendance in the West is receding and, at best, ours is stagnant. The average age in the UMC has risen to 57 years.

In this environment, the worst thing we can do is to allow complacency to set in. The world around us is unarguably changing and, to remain relevant, it demands that we find ways to change with it while steadfastly clinging to the unchangeable.

Another thing that can get in our way would be to lose sight of our guide – not keeping Christ at the center of everything we do. We are all better off when we remember that it's all about Him; and in doing so love more, appreciate more, forgive more, build each other up more, and live more in harmony with each other – each with the attitude of Christ Jesus toward the other.

"Can two people walk together without agreeing on the direction?" This question posed by the prophet Amos around 750 B.C. is just as appropiate for us today. It has taken people of many talents and perspectives for Beech Grove to be in ministry for the past 140 plus years, and it will take the same diversity to make a difference in the years to come. Yet, our church lacks a clear unifying direction, universally affirmed, to guide our everyday decisions and activities. I am hopeful that the goals adopted with the 5 Talent Academy will provide that missing compass.

I recently read an op-ed asserting that far-reaching spiritual reawakening can only happen through personal experience. As a church, we have plenty of room to grow as witnesses to God's grace. We all have our own personal story of faith, a reason that being a Christian matters. A greater willingness to share these stories can enrich our relationships and our understanding of each other and become a powerful example to those yet to experience Christ's love and acceptance. So, we should resolve to find the confidence to witness to those in our surrounding community and invite them to share in The Good News.

Jesus reminds us that the harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few. As a small church we experience the challenges that come from having a limited full-time staff. This reality demands that everyone pitches in and finds a way to volunteer the best of their prayers, presence, service, talents, and witness. For 2013, I am encouraged by recent efforts to reduce our committee sizes and to enlist a greater diversity of participation in the life and work of the church.

Despite these uncertain times, there are reasons to be confident in the future of Christ's church in Driver. Beech Grove has much strength upon which to build. First and foremost is our strength and our redeemer, Jesus Christ. We are assured in Romans 8:31 that "If God is for us, who can be against us?" With Him on our side and Scripture as our foundation, we are a church built on a rock.

We genuinely care and are concerned for one another. This is what attracted Melissa and me to Beech Grove and I believe that it will be equally attractive to others. We need to find a way to extend that same love and care more often to those outside of our walls.

We are a generous church, blessed with sufficient financial resources and a strong balance sheet giving us the freedom to take some chances as the hands and feet of Christ.

Our location in the center of a growing residential community is a strength that has gone largely untapped. There are over 4,200 households and 4 public schools inside of a 3 mile radius of our church, filled with residents who are largely upper middle class, middle-aged, and married with children.

Scripture tells us that "There is a time for everything, and a season for every activity under the heavens." What is 2013 a time for? Looking ahead, God has blessed us with opportunites to make a greater difference in our community and in the life of the church, one of which is participation in the 5 Talent Academy. The program can't do anything by itself and efforts by a few will fall short; but if we embrace this initiative as an entire church, this three year program can focus our labors on stimulating growth in attendance, stewardship, spiritual maturity, professions of faith, and ministering with the poor which are all evident in today's vital and growing churches.

There are unlimited opportunities to expand our Children's and Youth programs to attract those young families around us, and I am optimistic about the enthusiasm and leadership that Darryl and Bob will bring to this effort and we should support them completely. Additionally, hundreds of local children enter through our doors each month as part of Scouting ministries and we should find ways to strengthen those relationships.

I think that most of us can agree that agricultural tax breaks do nothing for the kingdom, so we should commit to finding creative ways to use the back land right now.

Creating real relationships with those in need has the power to change the lives of the recipient and the giver. Similar to laity experiences with Camp Rainbow and the Society of Saint Andrew this year, we should offer more events that go beyond charitable support from a distance and instead encourage active participation in outreach.

And this year, we should commit to diversifying our income stream by establishing an Endowment Fund. Widely successful at universities, an endowment would offer congregants a way to make a lasting impact and ensure that Beech Grove can continue its mission and ministry beyond our lifetimes. It will also serve to mitigate risk by relaxing our reliance on regular giving and Easter Egg Factory profits.

Dear Brothers and Sisters, even as the world distances itself from religion, Jesus still commands us to "go and make disciples." The worst response would be for us to turn inward and simply hope that people walk through our door. The threats to our efforts are real and we must acknowledge our weaknesses; but together as Christ's church in 2013 and with God leading the way, let's step out in faith, and commit to real results which capitalize on our strengths and intentionally take advantage of clear opportunities to show Christ to those around us.
